Under some very active and energetic chairmen the Club progressed rapidly, the biggest membership was probably during one of the terms of Roger Urlwin (ZL3MG) when some 60 to 70 meeting notices were sent out each month Membership ranged far and wide, with members in Aylesbury, Irwell, Tai Tapu, Halswell Hoon Hay, Wigram, Fendalton, and of course, Hornby and Sockburn.

The clubroom were shifted a few years ago to another Council site in Holmes Park, Upper Riccarton. Whether this has served any major purpose is open to question. My apologies to those whose names I cannot recall. It is an unfortunate fact of life that clubs such as ours at some stage loose a bit of continuity - we lost ours when most of our early records, minute books, etc., unfortunately vanished. They were not taken by the vandals who at one time pilfered many items of equipment from the rooms, but just failed to show up when office bearers changed. These notes are therefore written from memory and if there is any major personality or event which others can recall, and feel they should be highlighted, I am sure the Editor will accommodate a letter in his columns, to that effect.

It is probably worth noting that the writer for several years conducted learners classes' in the Waterloo Road rooms, after having done this for several years for the Christchurch Branch at the home of Arthur (ZL3JD).

Although Hornby was founded in a spirit of friction and discontent it is pleasant to note that the hatchet was buried some years ago, and the liaison and co-operation between Christchurch and Hornby is very good. That is as it should be. Hornby made its point, and the movement is stronger as a result.
